2011 Workshop

On January 12, 2011 we held a post-conference symposium entitled: International Regulations and Requirements for the Import/Export of Reproductive Biomaterials: Embryos, Semen and Tissues. Since there was not enough time (organization began in June, 2010) to ask the invited speakers for written articles of their presentations, we asked the speakers to submit the slides from their presentations so we can summarize the information in an article. CANDES Secretary Nucharin Songsasen and Chair Naida Loskutoff then sent the draft article to each of the speakers for approval. The proceedings article was published in the September 2011 issue of the IETS Embryo Transfer Newsletter.
